Saskia Hieber, International Political Studies Chief, Bavarian Academy for Political Education and expert on China's energy and security policy, will chair the discussions.

Biographies:

Franco Algieri is senior research fellow at the Center for Applied Policy Research, University of Munich, where he is responsible for the projects on EU Asia policy and EU foreign and security policy. He is a member of the Working Group on European Integration (AEI), a guest professor at Renmin University of China in Beijing, and lecturer at Munich University. He received his Ph.D. at Tübingen University with a study on EU China policy.

Dan Blumenthal's research at American Enterprise Institute includes China, Taiwan, the Koreas and US-China relations. Before joining AEI in late 2004 he was senior director for China, Taiwan and Mongolia in the U.S. Secretary of Defense's Office of International Security affairs. Before his service at the Dept. of Defense he practiced international corporate law in New York. He holds a J.D. from Duke University Law School and M.A. from the School of Advanced International Studies, Johns Hopkins University.

Peter Brookes is Senior Fellow and Director of Asian Studies at the Heritage Foundation. Before coming to Heritage he served as Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Asian and Pacific Affairs in the Office of Secretary Donald Rumsfeld and as professional staff member of the Republican staff on the International Relations Committee of the U.S. House of Representatives. He also served as an intelligence officer with the CIA and has a distinguished military career as a U.S. Navy pilot. He is a graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy, the Naval War College, Georgetown University and Johns Hopkins University.

Saskia Hieber heads the international relations program at the Bavarian Academy of Political Education in Tutzing and teaches Chinese foreign affairs at Munich University. Previously she worked as research associate in the USA and Asia sections of the German Institute for International and Security Affairs in Berlin and Ebenhausen. She holds a Ph.D. from the University of Munich and a M.A. from London University School of Oriental and African Studies.

Markus Taube, professor for East Asian economic studies at the University of Duisburg-Essen, is also a guest professor at the University of Wuhan, a Member of the OECD-China Investment Network, the Euro-Asia Management Studies Association (EAMSA) and the International Society for New Institutional Economics (ISNIE), among many other professional associations. In 1998 he received the coveted Walter-Eucken Prize for his work in institutional economics. He received his Ph.D. from Ruhr University Bochum.
